In celebration of this 350th anniversary year of the 1662 Prayer Book and 50th anniversary of the Canadian Anglican 1962 Prayer Book, the parish of St. John's Church, Elora, in collaboration with the PBSC Grand Valley Branch, is hosting a weekend with the Revd. The theme for the weekend is "Prayer and the Prayer Book". On Saturday November 3<sup>rd</sup> Fr. Dunbar will lead a retreat from 9:30 AM to 2:00 PM at The Retreat, Nassagaweya ([www.theretreat.ca](http://www.theretreat.ca)), the home of Chris and Jeannie Houston, located at 11679 1st Line, Moffat (west of Milton). The title will be "Be Still and Know That I Am God: The

**To the Clergy and People of the Diocese of Toronto**

The Church of England has chosen today to celebrate the 350<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the 1662 Book of Common Prayer. For the Anglican Church of Canada, 2012 also marks the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the 1962 Book of Common Prayer (Canada).

One of the most powerful symbols of Anglican unity is the heritage of the Book of Common Prayer. Across the globe, the common familiarity of the Anglican liturgy in its language and pattern binds our Church together throughout the Communion. If you want to know an Anglican understanding of a doctrine, you are more apt to find it in praying the liturgy of the Church than reading an approved theologian or a doctrinal statement. *Lex orandi, lex credendi*: we pray what we believe, we believe what we pray. The piety expressed through the theology of Archbishop Thomas Cranmer has provided the underpinnings of Anglican expressions of worship worldwide.

With newer rites taking prominence in our parish churches, we are now in our second generation of Anglicans who may not be well acquainted with the Book of Common Prayer. But for the generations that preceded them, the familiar words and phrases of the Book of Common Prayer continue to be a constant in their devotions. As the former Bishop of Lincoln, the Rt Rev. John Saxbee, has said, "... perhaps of most importance is the fact that the BCP Offices and orders of service remain the only ones I can recite by heart. As and when my sight fails and my mind wanders, these words will still be on my lips and in my heart, and for that I remain ever thankful."

You will recall a recent article in the Anglican Journal in which the Prayer Book Society of Canada suggested keeping either Monday, September 3 or Sunday, December 2 as a day to observe the anniversary of the Prayer Book. Monday September 3 marks the first recorded celebration of the Eucharist in Canada using the Book of Common Prayer, by the Rev. Robert Walfall at Frobisher Bay in 1578. Advent Sunday, December 2 is the date in 1962 when the new Canadian Prayer Book was officially adopted for use.

I urge you to celebrate the gift and heritage of our Book of Common Prayer in a manner that is appropriate to your parish.

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**The Prayer Book Society of Canada** was founded in 1986 by Anglicans who were alarmed at the erosion of classical Anglican doctrine, worship and spirituality that was proceeding alongside the adoption of new liturgies. The Society's aim is briefly to support the continuing use of the Prayer Book for all who value it as their preferred medium of worship, preserving as it does faithfulness to Holy Scripture and adherence to the orthodox Anglican doctrine of the Christian faith. The Mission Statement of the Society, adopted in 1995, is: "To promote the understanding and use of the Book of Common Prayer as a scriptural system of nurture for life in Christ".

The Society operates on two levels: the national level and the branch level. The National Council is responsible for setting policy and direction for the Society, and for overseeing activities with a national scope. All branch presidents are *ex officio* members of the National Council. The branches are individually responsible for organizing local activities and initiatives in their own geographical areas, in support of the aims and objectives of the Society.

**The Ontario Council of PBSC Branches** is an informal coalition of branches in southern Ontario, formed in 1994. It serves as a forum for the planning of joint activities, and provides a network of support for the branches. It publishes this newsmagazine, "**The Lamp**", which appears quarterly in the months of March, June, September and December.
