## 2012 - The BCP Anniversary Essay Competition!

As you know, in celebration of the 350<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the 1662 Book of Common Prayer and of the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the 1962 Book of Common Prayer (Canada) in 2012, the Ottawa Branch is holding a national essay competition with the intention of raising the interest in and use of the *Book of Common Prayer* amongst Canadians aged 17 - 30.

Prizes of \$2,500, \$1,500, and \$1,000 (the Elaine de Temple Prize) are being offered for the best essays of approximately 3,000 words on the topic, "Discuss the relevance of the *Book of Common Prayer* in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century, in the light of two given quotations".

The closing date for applications to be received was June 30, 2012. A number of very interesting essays were received, and they have been sent on to the markers, three eminent Canadian Anglican theologians. We expect to award the Prizes before the end of the year. We can look forward to reading the prize-winning essays, which will be published for our membership in our Newsletter, and perhaps more widely too.

Many thanks to our faithful member, the Reverend Dr. Ronald Hunt, who has managed this competition for us and is now staying in touch with the markers.

**The 2<sup>nd</sup> Cranmer Conference - 2012 (North Bay)**

The title of this year's Conference was "*The Murder of Thomas Cranmer*" and was held from Friday, August 24<sup>th</sup> to Sunday, August 26<sup>th</sup>. The Rector of the Parish, Fr Andrew Nussey, a member of the Society's National Council, organized the Conference in his parish. Our Branch gave financial support and was included amongst the 'Patrons and Supporters' of the Conference.

*Here are some reflections from Fr Nussey:*

The Cranmer Conference was once again held in North Bay, Ontario in August of this year. Several young people were in attendance as we enjoyed glorious music, splendid food, and captivating speakers. This year's keynote speaker was Fr. Tim Perry of Sudbury, Ontario who outlined for us the implications behind "The Murder of Thomas Cranmer" and what the late Archbishop's martyrdom means for us Anglicans and Christians of today. Fr. Tim Connor of London, Ontario was the chaplain, Fr. George Kwari of Callander, Ontario was the banquet speaker, and Mr. Aaron James of Rochester, New York was the choir director and organist. Everyone came together to provide an encouraging weekend of learning and fun for all involved.

Next year a new kind of conference is being planned: The Cranmer Theological Conference will be held in May of next year during the week and it will be open to people of all ages with a special component for younger adults. **The 32<sup>nd</sup> Annual Atlantic Theological Conference**

***"The New Atheism"***

*The following reflections and comments are provided by Fr Andrew Nussey, from North Bay, and one of this year's Conference Delegates sponsored by the Ottawa Branch.*

The Atlantic Theological Conference this year was held in Charlottetown and the theme was "The New Atheism". It was suggested that those attending the conference read *Why God Won't Go Away* by Alister McGrath, which was a comprehensive introduction to the contemporary and popular proponents of atheism.

Each and every paper was thought-provoking and informative. In his opening paper, the Rev. Duncan Dormor of St. John's College in Cambridge gave an overview of the New Atheism, Dr. Stephen Snobelen of the History of Science and Technology Programme at the University of King's College in

Halifax spoke about Science and the New Atheism, and Dr. David Deane of the Atlantic School of Theology in Halifax spoke about Nietzsche and the Existence of God.

To simply highlight a couple more of the speakers and their papers, Dr. Gary Thorne, the Chaplain of Dalhousie University and the University of King's College in Halifax, showed us how a single-layered and literal reading of Scripture gives fodder for the "new atheists" to attack the Christian faith in a simple way, while Dr. Thomas Curran, Associate Professor of Humanities at the University of King's College in Halifax, noted that the paradoxical nature of the religious mind--our logic and principles--is not adequately considered by the New Atheists (this is helped by the Christian's own simple approach to Scripture and faith).

Moreover, Dr. Curran, who offered a summary of the conference at its conclusion, suggested that the criticisms levelled by the New Atheists, while facile and insubstantial, nevertheless offer us Christians a challenge to elaborate and clarify our beliefs due to the popularity of our detractors: this can help us enrich our faith.

As always, the Atlantic Theological Conference was a worthwhile gathering, not only for the information received but also for the splendid worship and the opportunity to connect with friends old and new.

### ***NOTES FROM THE TREASURER***

So far in 2012, the Branch has as usual donated \$500 to the Cranmer Conference, \$500 to the St. Michael Youth Camp, \$500 to the cost of the National Newsletter, and \$700 to clergy attending the Atlantic Theological Conference in June. As well, the Branch incurred the usual administrative costs of sending out our Newsletters.

Perhaps because of the interest generated by the Essay Competition, the Branch has so far received more donations than last year: to the end of July, we have received \$2,850 in donations, as well as the very generous donation of the Third Prize of the Essay Competition in memory of Miss Elaine de Temple. Although this is less than the amount we received in donations a few years ago, it is very considerably better than last year: thank you all very much!

I would point out, however, that we have yet to pay out the \$5,000 in prize money for the Essay Competition, of which the Branch will have to find \$4,000 for the First and Second Prizes; that will use up most of our income this year, regardless of our other expenses and the expected grants we

have already made, as outlined in the first paragraph.

We are most grateful that our members continue to support the work of the Branch through financial donations. Your help is always appreciated, and all contributions are fully tax-receiptable.

Please look for our usual mailing in October which will include the sale of 2013 BCP Calendars made available by the Prayer Book Society of Canada.
