The following reflections and comments were provided by Fr Frank Kirby. He was one of last year's Conference Delegates sponsored by the Ottawa Branch.

The New Atheism

Atlantic Theological Conference St. Peter's Cathedral Charlottetown, PEI June 26-29, 2012

I attended the Atlantic Theological Conference for the first time this past summer, fitting it into a vacation in Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick, and the northeast American States of New York, Vermont, New Hampshire and Maine. After a three-day drive through the states and New Brunswick, in pouring rain the whole time (before the drought settled in), I arrived in Charlottetown in time to check into my B&B, just a couple of blocks from St Peter's Cathedral, and to attend the opening Choral Evensong.

The lectures began the following day, Wednesday, with an "Overview of the New Atheism", by the Rev. Duncan Dormor, President and Dean of St John's College in Cambridge. I must admit that I was only vaguely aware of this "new atheism", but I soon gained a sense of what it is all about, and the challenge it presents to us, people of faith in the early 21st century. The titles of four more lectures, "The Bible: foundational document for the New Atheism", "Original Sin as the Evil of Religion", "Religion and Science", and finally, and rather dauntingly, "Nietzsche and the Existence of God", might give you a notion of the scope of the talks. I regret that I do not have the time to give you a summary of what was said (nor could I recall much, had I the time!), but suffice it to say that I came away with a clearer idea of the arguments put forth by proponents of this particular critique of Christianity, and any faith for that matter. But it is Christianity, however, and in particular evangelical Protestantism, that is the principal target of the "New Atheists" – Richard Dawkins, Lawrence Krauss and David Mills being perhaps the foremost spokespersons.

One thing that was impressed upon me was the relative shallowness of the New Atheist critique of Christianity, which is itself a caricature of what we Anglicans would think of as our faith. But equally it was brought home to me that we Anglicans, and other "mainline" Christians have much too shallow an understanding of our faith, which leaves us often unable to answer adequately the criticisms of "Christianity" in general. In these days of growing, and sometimes aggressive, secularism, we practicing Christians, Anglican and others, need to have a deeper comprehension of what our faith actually teaches us about ourselves, and the world we all live in. We cannot leave ourselves open to

the attacks (and that is not too strong a word, I came to appreciate) of the new atheists, who can inflict serious damage on people whose faith is weak and inarticulate. If the attacks of the new atheism are sometimes shallow, they will only be answered by those with a depth of faith, and moreover a faith which is *practised in daily life*.

The conference began with Evensong, and at the centre of it, on the Thursday evening, was a splendid celebration of Solemn Mass for the feast of SS Peter and Paul (Peter being of course the patron saint of the Cathedral). Father Dormor preached an excellent sermon, tying in Archbishop Thomas Cranmer to the celebration (he admitted that it was a sermon he had preached on another occasion in Cranmer's memory – but it was very well adapted to the Charlottetown occasion!). He pointed out how often Cranmer used the word "heart" in his liturgical writings, to underscore how "heartfelt" was the reforming archbishop's devotion to the Gospel message. It struck me that we in our own time must be as heartfelt in our expression of, and living out, our faith.

The conference ended on the Friday, after the fifth and final lecture. All the lectures were responded to by articulate speakers – I don't know if they were given the lecture notes ahead of time, but if they weren't, they were very quick on their intellectual feet! All in all, it was a rewarding experience, especially so in the surroundings of St Peter's Cathedral, and its exquisite Chapel of All Souls. I stayed on in Charlottetown through the weekend, attending the Eucharist at the Cathedral on Sunday, which this year fell on July 1st. Celebrating Canada Day in the cradle of Confederation was a special experience, and was followed by holiday time in PEI, New Brunswick and the aforementioned American states, in glorious sunshine almost everyday ... but that is another story.



NOTES FROM THE TREASURER

By the end of 2012, the Branch was still in the black - but only just! The cost of offering the Essay Contest on the BCP, open to young Canadians aged 17 - 30, was quite expensive - a total of \$5,800 - as a one-time expenditure. As you know, our Branch Executive had decided that it was worth putting so many funds into this project, as it would do so much to raise awareness of the BCP among young Canadians, and it certainly succeeded in that!

Perhaps because of the interest generated by the Essay Competition, the Branch received more donations in 2012 than in the preceding few years: we received a total of \$5,828.50 in donations in 2012, compared to only about \$3,500 the previous year. This of course included the very generous donation of the Third Prize of the Essay Competition in memory of Miss Elaine de Temple. Thank you all very much!

Having paid out all the Essay Contest money in 2012, as well as our usual donations to the Cranmer Conference, the St. Michael's Youth Camp, the National Newsletters, and to clergy attending the annual Atlantic Theological Conference, our bank balance at the end of December stood at \$1,212.76,

having started the year at \$5,606.24. If we are to be able to carry on with our usual ongoing programmes this year, including things like our own Newsletter, we will need income to come in.

THE BOOK OF COMMON PRAYER ESSAY COMPETITION 2012

During 2012, the Prayer Book Society of Canada, Ottawa Branch, offered an essay contest in celebration of the 350th anniversary of the 1662 Book of Common Prayer and of the 50th anniversary of the 1962 Book of Common Prayer (Canada), with the intention of raising the interest in and use of the *Book of Common Prayer* amongst Canadians aged 17 - 30. The topic for the essay was "The relevance of the *Book of Common Prayer* in the 21st Century."

The Prayer Book Society of Canada, Ottawa Branch, now announces the winners of the 2012 Essay Competition. Three prizes were awarded, in the amounts of \$2,500, \$1,500, and \$1,000 (The M. Elaine de Temple Prize).
